9. DISCUSSION AND DIRECTION

A. Possible rezoning of B1 Zoning Districts to B2 Zoning Districts – Per Commissioner Curran

City Manager Loucks and City Planner Wood explained the variations between B1 and B2 zoning districts and offered several examples of scenarios which have recently prompted individual businesses to request variances, conditional uses or waivers of specific restrictions relative to B1 districts. Matt Wood offered additional clarification of specific development standards.

Unanimous consensus was reached to move forward with exploring the possibility of rezoning specific plazas within B1 Zoning Districts to B2 Zoning Districts.

B. Request by the Business Advisory Board for the enactment of a moratorium on the enforcement of City Code Section 25-24.

Bradley S. Hartman, Business Advisory Board Chair, presented a recommendation from the board for a six-month moratorium on specific free standing signage code enforcement in shopping centers, plazas and retail strip centers.

Consensus was reached to direct staff to draft a resolution granting a moratorium on the enforcement of specific signage codes.

 C. Incorporation of the Business Advisory Board review into land use matters where businesses may be impacted – Per Commissioner Curran

Consensus was reached to solicit the recommendation of the Business Advisory Board in land use matters where businesses may be impacted.

13. OPEN PUBLIC MEETING

Diane Sori, 3794 Bimini Avenue, reiterated the information about the Davie/Cooper City Relay for Life event and suggested that the Commission made an incorrect decision regarding the towing contract.

Ed Wooley, 11038 Nashville Drive, suggested that the City should not attempt to manage its own pension and benefit funds.

Gladys Wilson, 5155 SW 90th Avenue, criticized the Commission's decision to not award the towing contract to A Superior Towing tonight.

Walt Jolliff, 11095 Bismarck Place, commented on a Census data on business-supplied revenue to the City.

10. POLICE CHIEF'S REPORT

Chief Hale thanked Commissioner Mallozzi for her involvement with the Fraud Awareness presentation. He reported that 12,000 lbs. of documents were shredded at the Shred-A-Thon and 22,000 doses of medication were destroyed at Operation Medicine Cabinet. He further reported on two car burglary instances.

11. FIRE CHIEF'S REPORT

Chief Sievers reported that the CERT team will participate in a drill on Saturday, March 26^{th} at Central Broward Regional Park in Lauderhill. The team will partner with Dania Beach CERT and the scenario will replicate the aftermath of a tornado touch-down.

12. CITY MANAGER REPORT

City Manager Loucks announced that the Senior Advisory Board will be meeting for the first time on March 23rd and they will be establishing their meeting times and board chairs at that time. He further reported that the first Volunteer Appreciation Dinner for all advisory board members will be held on June 7th. Additionally, Mr. Loucks announced that the printing of the Water Quality Report will now be done in black and white at a savings of \$500.00.

14. COMMISSIONERS' CONCERNS/REPORTS

Commissioner Curran wished his fellow Commissioners well as they travel to Tallahassee for Broward Days. He encouraged community support for the Davie/Cooper City Relay for Life and reiterated his announcement for the Autism Awareness event. He additionally suggested that FRS be a consideration in the Pension Workshop discussions.

Commissioner Sims suggested that potential lawsuits should never affect Commission decisions and questioned the delay in the automation of the City's Accounts Receivable system in conjunction with the web site and the need to put the needs of our residents and business owners first.

Commissioner Green wished a safe and productive trip to his fellow Commission members who will be traveling to Broward Days and thanked Commissioner Curran for allowing him to serve on the Autism Awareness Day project.

Mayor Eisinger commended Chief Hale on his efforts with all of the recent community events and staff for the recent edition of the Cooper City News and Views publication.
