


Mosquito Control: About Us




Countywide, year-round mosquito-abatement program for tracking, spraying and surveying the mosquito population in Broward County.

- Spraying areas with reported concentrations of mosquitoes
- Checking mosquito breeding sites
- Setting traps to determine the types of mosquitos in different areas
- Treating standing water from rain events
- Spraying areas requested by residents
- Performing aerial spraying, truck, and hand spraying


Zika Virus: Mosquito Type



- Spread primarily through mosquito bites
- *Aedes-aegypti* mosquito
 - Dengue fever
 - Yellow fever
 - West Nile fever
 - Chikungunya
 - Eastern equine encephalitis
- Found on all continents (except Antarctica)
- Distinctive black and white markings on body and legs




Zika Virus: Mosquito Type (continued)




- Active and bite during daytime
- Peak biting periods: early morning and evening before dusk
- Urban mosquito: lives outdoors and indoors
- Prefer to bite people
 - Carbon dioxide
 - Body odor
- Only females bite
- Two-week average lifespan





Mosquito: Life Cycle




- Mosquitos need very little water to breed
- Lay up to 250 eggs at a time in still water
 - Rain barrels
 - Buckets
 - Old swimming pools
 - Flower pots
 - Water-holding plants (e.g. bromeliads)
- Hatch in 7-15 days



Mosquito: Life Cycle



Breaking the Cycle: Public Education and Awareness




- Reduce and eliminate larval habitats
- Dump standing water
- Dispose or cover water-holding containers
- Treat water bodies with long-lasting larvicide
- Encourage residents to call for spray requests



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Breaking the Zika Virus Cycle

Public Education and Awareness



Urban mosquitos can live indoors and outdoors; they will bite during daytime.

Mosquitos need very little water to breed.

- Coconut shells


